During the talent portion of the day, we raffled off several unique items like become Principal for the day, Prom & grad Night tickets, coupons for money off Jostens Class rings. Ultimately, Chaminade high school teacher Mike O'Palko promised to cut off his signature pony tail which he has had for over 20 years and offered a raffle to be the one to cut off his hair which students were really excited about! It did end up raining on the day of our event so we had to move everything inside our gym and did not have the turn out we were hoping for however we were still able to raise \$5500.00 through our event.

			quarters, which counted against your total. The idea is you put all change and bills except for quarters in your seminar and you put quarters in the seminar bucket who you think is leading. Each day at lunch NJHS and AVID students counted change and announced the totals in the morning. In less than 2 weeks we collected \$3,927.83! To top it off, the PTSO had a dance the final day of our fundraiser and gave all the proceeds to the Red Cross for Haiti Earthquake Relief. An American Red Cross representative came to our school assembly and the students presented a giant check (as well as a real one) for \$5727.00!

Together we led a student effort to join hands and hearts to help those in need by organizing a Haiti Benefit Concert that was held on Saturday, March 6, 2010 at Plum Creek Christian Church. All proceeds from this benefit concert went to Matthew:25 Ministries out of Kenwood, Ohio, and the Hands & Feet Project to be used directly for Haiti relief efforts. This concert featured two popular bands. A Wayward Heart is comprised of a group of guys who formed the band just Outside 50 US States of Grayson, KY. This band is comprised of some local area talent and they opened for the event. Next on stage was the Know Hope Collective, featuring Mark Stuart & Will McGinniss from the nationally known band, Audio Adrenaline. Audio Adrenaline has performed around the world, acquired 2 Grammy Awards, Multiple Dove Awards, 18 #1 singles, and sales of over 3 million records! They are also extremely proud of the children's orphanages that they have built in Haiti through their Hands and Feet Ministry. This event was held at Plum Creek Christian Church located at 961 Nagel Road, Butler, KY. Doors opened at 5:30 p.m. and the concert began at 7:00 p.m. Ticket cost was \$20.00 per person (general seating) which included admission to the concert, a concession drink and a concession snack during the event. STUDENTS planned the event and our council led the public relations and we were able to announce it on Cincinnati radio stations, newspapers, as well as local area newspapers. The large church worked well to provide the needed items to accommodate such a large band. The KUNA team organized the Haiti relief fund and worked with Matthew:25 Ministries. Student Council's job was to sell tickets, get the word out, find workers, staff, security, and keep everyone "in the know." Our student council President created a mass email list to club advisors, local administrators, newspapers, radio stations, churches, students, and prominent community members to see where the help could come from. Here, everyone was on the same page and we were able to see how it could come together. Clubs donated baskets for a silent auction as well as water for the concessions. ROTC provided parking and student council workers cleaned up and supervised the day as a whole. Our historian took charge and worked as a leader to assign jobs and work with her church to sync the jobs to positions within the church. We had members selling merchandise and had community members act as security and staff members. When working with a professional band, our students had to be professional and they proved to be just that. When students were interviewed in the Cincinnati Enquirer, the STUDENTS were interviewed, as the advisors didn't even serve on the council. The nearly 300 attendees, 100 helpers, 2 speakers, and the 2 bands all commented on how great the event was and they were amazed that such a young group of students put on such a great event. It was systematic, it had a great message, and it raised funds for a great cause. At the close of the event, students worked hard and counted the funds. A total of \$2500 was collected in 3 hours and we are so proud of our VERY small

The teacher with the largest donation received a Cookbook that was donated from the community. We presented our check to the Red Cross on Tuesday, march 9, 2010.

			Faculty and students (who normally wear uniforms) paid \$20 for the opportunity to wear jeans and a Saint Viator spirit shirt for a week. Money was collected in homeroom and students were given a wristband to wear all week. We reached out to our parents and to our alums as well. It was a huge success - we raised \$30,712 within one week's time and were able to send this much needed money to the Viatorians in Haiti to provide basic relief services and support to the hundreds of families they minister to.

On Hoodies for Haiti Day, students could donate \$3 in their first period class to receive a sticker identifying them as someone who was permitted to wear a hoodie to class all day.
Fairfield Prep	Connecticut	NASC-HS	On a Friday in February, our school had a spirit day to raise money for the victims of the earthquake in Haiti. Students who made a donation of at least \$2 on this day were permitted to wear school t-shirts or sweatshirts instead of their normal shirt and tie.
Andrew Jackson Middle School	West Virginia	NASC-ML	We had a dance and proceeds went to the Red Cross.
North Clackamas Christian School	Oregon	NASC-HS	The student council invited our 54 high school students to donate two hours of their time on a Saturday afternoon to collect and turn in pop cans for Haiti. Small groups canvassed the surrounding neighborhoods collecting cans, and adult drivers bused the cans between the walking groups and those stationed at the can return machines. The can drive went so well that many of the volunteers stayed an extra hour to help turn in the cans at three local grocery stores. In two hours we collected around 5000 cans, earning over \$165 for Haiti Relief. We gave the donation for the Haiti Relief efforts through Medical Teams International.
Fargo South High school	North Dakota	NASC-HS	Students at Fargo South were allowed to wear hats to school for a day, if they purchased a "Hats for Haiti" sticker. The stickers were sold for \$2.00 at a booth run by student council members. The project raised approximately \$800.00.
Cinco Ranch High School	Texas	NASC-HS	The Cinco Ranch High School Student Council collected \$3000 and donated it directly to the Haiti Red Cross. We collected the money for two weeks via lunch collections, teacher collections, and faculty donations.
Sheepshead Bay High School	New York	NASC-HS	Students initiated and participated in the following events: Two-Day Bake Sale sponsored by the Senior Government class sold home baked chocolate chip cookies. 500 cookies were sold for 50 cents each during lunch periods After-School Walk-A-Thon - hosted by the Track & Field Team - open to the student body and faculty/staff of the school. Minimum donation for participation: \$10 Hearts for Haiti - students hand-crafted heart shaped pins & sold them to the student body. Donors also received a card with the Haitina flag and the statement "I did something + for Haiti by donating to the Red Cross" with a space to put their name. Cards were posted to make a path around the main floor of the school and ended in the student cafeteria where cards were arranged on the main wall to form the shape of Haiti. All donations were divided equally between the American Red Cross and Doctors Without Borders
Creekview High School	Texas	NASC-HS	We joined forces with a number of on-campus organizations to collect money for the American Red Cross Relief Fund. We collected at school as well as at all sporting events.
Branson High School	Missouri	NASC-HS	In conjunction with a local private school and individuals in the community, Branson High School Student Council sponsored a drive to collect infant formula and bottles to donate to an orphanage in Port-Au-Prince.



			We cooperated with a large church congregation in a neighboring city to transport our donations to Haiti. Student Council representatives manned a table before school and during all lunch shifts for two weeks. We also advertised via local radio and TV stations, so we received donations from the community at large. Student Council members inventoried, packed, and transported the donations of ready-to-feed formula and bottles to the city with the help of our high school principal and activities director. In addition to those donations, we received over \$1400 in cash. Student Council voted to donate the cash directly to Canaan Orphanage in Montrouis, Haiti. One of us had direct contact with the site, and we knew the money was needed for shelter and food for refugees from Port-Au-Prince. All together, BHS Student Council collected over 500 quarts of infant formula, 1500 bottles, and \$1500 in cash.
Clint Small Middle School	Texas	NASC-ML	Clint Small Student Council collected \$531.20 to donate to the Red Cross Haiti Relief fund. The donations were collected through advisory classes for one week.
Shawnee Mission Northwest High School	Kansas	NASC-HS	Our StuCo really felt convicted to do a fundraiser for Haiti - our project goal for Hope for Haiti was \$2,000-3,000. StuCo organized a 5th hour class competition for one week at the end of January. We had over 80 classes participate. There were 40 small classes (under 22 students) and 40 large classes (over 23 students). StuCo created routes within our school and a team of StuCo students were responsible for 6-7 classrooms each. Each day, StuCo teams went into the classrooms and delivered a fact about Haiti - devastation and destruction, needs, death tolls, etc. Then they would ask students to take a collection. The last day of the drive, students wore Red for Haiti - it was amazing to walk down the hallway and see a sea of red shirts as students were supporting the drive. The incentive for classes to win included a class competition during an all school assembly. The top two largest collections from small and large classes were able to choose 2 delegates from their class to participate in a Crazy Olympics obstacle course. Students had to leap through hoola hoops and somersault, then wheelbarrow on their hands through tires, find Waldo in the crowd, make a basket with a volleyball, twirl around 10 times with their foreheads on a baseball bat, and then throw a pie into a teacher's face. We ended up raising over \$6,600 and we donated it to UNICEF because they pledged 100% of donations would help kids in Haiti. The Crazy Olympics was held in mid-February and was a huge success as students had fun representing their classes with the knowledge that we really made a difference.
Ottawa Hills Junior High School	Ohio	NASC-ML	The Ottawa Hills Junior High Student Council sponsored a dance with the theme "Hula for Haiti" which had a Hawaiian theme! All of the proceeds (\$420.00) went directly to the American Red Cross for use in Haiti!
Peshtigo High School	Wisconsin	NASC-HS	After seeing a local school (Crivitz) make a donation right away, Peshtigo High School student council called that school and others and set up a competition among the local schools to see who could raise the most money. The headline paragraph is included below following by the write up on what Peshtigo did in its own schools. Coleman, Crivitz, Marinette, Menominee, Oconto and Peshtigo worked together to raise money for charity. The six local schools competed against one another in a friendly competition to see who could raise the most money to help the Haitian Earthquake survivors. The six schools were allowed to raise the money in any way that they saw fit donate and to donate it to the charity of their choice. All together from January 6th through February 5th a total of \$12,306.72 was raised for charity. Each school has their own



			<p>story to tell about their fundraising. Peshtigo – Student leaders from Student Council, Volunteer Club and NHS voiced their concern about what had happened wanted to help the survivors of the Haitian Earthquake. An article in the local paper about Crivitz raising money got Peshtigo to contact Crivitz and other local schools to an informal contest to see who could raise the most money. With the competition in mind Peshtigo students then set up various “Pass the Hat for Haiti” activities. These activities included a day of school, where for a \$5 donation students were allowed to wear their hat or sunglasses in school that day. Also, a “hat” was passed at a variety of Peshtigo home sporting events including boys and girls basketball and the Peshtigo Wrestling Invitational. Through these activities a total of \$1361.57 was raised for Doctor’s Without Borders. The Peshtigo High School student council also donated \$1000 for UNICEF and \$500 for Feed The Children, bringing the total amount raised to \$2861.57.</p>
Boyer Valley Community School	Iowa	NASC-HS	<p>The BVHS Student Council conducted a toy drive to benefit children in Haiti orphanages. Ryan Schaben, senior representative for the student council, asked student council members of the request. BVHS student council members unanimously agreed to the toy drive. Heidi Schaben, Ryan’s cousin, belongs to a church group in Ames, where she is currently a student at Iowa State University. Heidi stated that another ISU college student is originally from Haiti and was adopted into a family from the United States around age 8. This student still has family in Haiti that has been affected by the earthquake on Jan. 12, 2010. He asked the church group for help and said the orphanages in the northern area of Haiti were in dire need of certain toys and supplies. Before the earthquake, this orphanage housed approximately 200 children; since the earthquake, this number has increased greatly. There was an application process that Heidi and other church group members had to go through in order to travel to Haiti. Heidi stated there were 120 applicants and 40-50 applicants were selected to go. Heidi was one of those selected applicants. Heidi and her fellow group members traveling to Haiti are responsible with coming up with their own funding in order to go. They will be going to a mission compound in northern Haiti and will be taking the toys and other supplies with them. Items that Heidi’s group is requesting include new or used smaller toys (they will need to fit in suitcases), peanut butter, anti-fungal cream, ibuprofen, and monetary donations. The monetary donations will be used toward getting the supplies there as well as buying any extra items for the orphanage. Heidi will be traveling to Haiti March 14-23rd and items were collected from February 23- March 12. Approximately 8 garbage bags of toys and peanut butter were dropped off at the BV school in Mrs. Jayne Klein’s middle school science room. Heidi is the daughter of Jim and Cindi Schaben and is a junior at ISU with a double major in agricultural studies and international agriculture.</p>
Sioux City North High School	Iowa	NASC-HS	<p>1. Silent Auction for Disaster Relief Student council members organized 7 baskets for a silent auction. Each grade level was responsible for creating a theme for a basket and for collecting items (almost entirely donations) to include in the basket. The baskets had themes like: “Movie Night,” “Coffee Lovers,” “Around Siouxland,” and “Car Care.” The baskets were auctioned during a varsity boy’s basketball game in February. All proceeds were donated to the American Red Cross for Haiti. 2. Student/Teacher Basketball Game The student council organized a basketball game between 10 students and 10 staff members. The game was organized to raise funds for the American Red Cross. The game was also held in February and featured</p>



			a half-time show and free-throw contest. Over 300 students, faculty, parents, and community members attended the event.
Elkland Area High school	Pennsylvania	NASC-HS	Our school raised \$230.00 for the relief fund by having a basketball player and cheerleader auction. The students that participated got permission from their teachers to miss class for a whole day. Then the school had a school assembly where the participants were auctioned to carry books and cafeteria trays for the student that purchased them for the day. The participants wore a heart that said "my heart belongs to ...". The bids started at a dollar and went as high as \$40.00. The students and teachers had fun participating in the event.
Bridgeport High School	Michigan	NHS	I have already submitted a report but my total was in error. We collected a total of \$270 for Haiti instead of the \$201 I reported earlier.
Narraguagus High School	Maine	NHS	The school's chapter of the NHS, in conjunction with the school's Student Government, sponsored a fundraising effort to assist earthquake victims in Haiti. Students sold paper bricks to students and family to "build" a house on the cafeteria windows. In addition to this activity, each homeroom was challenged to raise the most money, per student in their homeroom, for the prize of a pizza party, which was donated by a local store. Also, on Friday of the week, students were invited to pay \$1.00 to wear a hat for the day. In total, \$341.00 was raised in the effort. To make this project even more successful, a local organization, the Cole Land Transportation Museum, in Bangor, Maine, offered to match any funds raised, up to \$2,500. Because our school has taken part in the museum's veteran's interviews, we qualified to receive the funds and were able to donate a total of \$682.00 to the Salvation Army to aid in their assistance of the victims of the earthquake in Haiti.
Haskell Elementary School	New Jersey	NJHS	We sold homework passes for \$3.00 each. All teachers honored these passes; only one pass per teacher was available to the students, but they could buy passes for multiple teachers. Kindergarteners were able to buy stickers, which would buy them extra stickers on class sticker charts. We raised \$648.00
Colonial Forge High School	Virginia	NHS	We decided to raise money for UNICEF's earthquake relief efforts in Haiti and Chile. Our officers made pins with red and blue beads (the colors of the flags) to give to students who donated a dollar to the fund. These pins could be attached to bags or key chains. During each lunch shift, our NHS members collected money (and encouraged students to donate). At the end of the week, our chapter had raised about \$100 strictly from donations.
Bridgeport High School	Michigan	NHS	NHS members went around to students during both our lunch sessions with a donation box. They did this for a week. Also a few members attended two of our home basketball games and accepted donations.

After the occurrence of the brutal 7.1 magnitude earthquake, the global network responded with a sympathy and compassion that reminds us of the value of community, and the importance of serving in community. Led by Ms. Wong, the NHS of Boca Prep joined the surge of much needed assistance directed at the misfortunate victims in Haiti. In these types of situations, it is easy to be passive, to feel the sadness and the pain and to take note of the misfortune, but then to forget about it and to let it pass with only a simple nod. Ms. Wong would not let this happen to our school concerning the issue with Haiti and I am sure we can all say that we are happy someone took the initiative and started the NHS fundraiser "Helping Hands for Haiti". Over two weeks time, canned food, diapers, water, clothes, blankets and much more flowed from the hands of generous givers to cardboard boxes in each classroom. After the collection period had finished, what lay between feeding a hungry family or sheltering a homeless soul was organization. Over a three-four hour period on two Saturday mornings, members of the NHS and Ms. Wong met at school to sort through the heaping piles of clothes and heavy boxes of food. The task was certainly tedious and not a favorable way to start the weekend but that was unimportant. What was important was that members of NHS and Ms. Wong were able to grasp the concept that they were obliged, as people of the world, to reach out and give whatever they could to the people in Haiti who desperately needed help. It may seem overly dramatic to put our school fundraiser in these terms, but humanity survives only because one person helps another, while another helps another, and another helps another. NHS participated in helping Haiti in this way on their Saturdays and the entire school participated through the donation process. Boca Prep can be proud to say that it contributed to the process of lending a hand to one in need in Haiti. Let this be a message that however busy our own lives may seem, however troubling our own affairs may be, there is always a duty to help people whose troubles greatly surpass our own.
