Planning a Successful

INDUCTION CEREMONY



The **NEHS Handbook** provides a complete overview to help you plan, implement, and evaluate your induction ceremony (see pages 43–51).

Consider the following questions:

- Will this be an all-school assembly or a smaller, more private affair? Discuss this question with your principal to determine what is best for your school.
- What will take place at the ceremony? A script and sample schedule for inductions is provided in the handbook (pages 44 and 46).

Look through the planning steps outlined on pages 45–47 of the handbook and determine how many helpers you'll need to make this happen. Build a team to share in the success of a well-planned and well-implemented induction ceremony.

END-OF-YEAR CHECKLIST

Get a head start on the next school year by taking a little time to get things in order.

Inventory. Check your spreadsheet of NEHS supplies. Make note of any items that need to be ordered at the beginning of the year. Consider setting reminders in your email calendar.

Member roster. Double-check your roster to ensure that all members are properly recorded. Make note of graduating members and those who will be transferring to other schools over the summer. Be sure to provide transfer members with a letter to take to their new chapter.

Officer selection. Have you elected your chapter officers for next year? Have all officers received an outline of their duties and responsibilities? Before the school year concludes, have one last meeting with outgoing and new officers.

Chapter calendar. Share a draft of your tentative schedule for selection and induction with your principal. If there are major projects in the pipeline, remind parents and fellow faculty members as well. Be sure that your selection procedure is published before you leave for the summer.

Ideas to End the Year On A **High Note**

Awards day. Consider providing special awards or recognition to members who have far exceeded your chapter's requirements. A variety of special items are available from the NEHS store (<http://store.nehs.org>) to commemorate the occasion, including gold cords and stoles. Some criteria to take into account when giving awards includes meeting attendance, project participation, and continued excellence in academic performance.

Chapter picnic. Invite all chapter members to an informal year-end get together to celebrate the year with food, games, and contests.

Parent recognition. Share a quick note with the parents of your members to show appreciation for their support of the chapter this year. Consider including a year-end summary of activities and expectations for the following year.
